There are real challenges to
sustaining hope right now, both in
Haiti and in North America.

In Haiti we work with people who
want to change their lives and
communities, but don't have the
money or educational resources to
do so. And with the U.S. economy
struggling, for many people it's a
sacrifice to give to help those in
another country. We've recently
had to trim our budget because
it's hard for people to give.

Haiti Partners depends on
hundreds of individuals and fami-
lies like you giving regularly. Thank
you. You should be encouraged
about the real difference we are
making together.

In Haiti now, there are many
challenges. We know of nonprofits
on the verge of leaving Haiti,
or whose projects are breaking
down. Some are finding it difficult
to work with people who do not
trust them (or each other) and are
critical of their processes. Foreign
organizations often work under
pressure to get things done quickly,
but sometimes without putting into
place systems, infrastructure, and
relationships that will last.

Haiti Partners is in it for the

Program Updates

Students Program: School got off to a good start of the new academic year. We are developing social business plans at all seven partner schools. And we broke ground on the Children's Academy.

Teachers Program: Training continues for teachers in our partner schools and for teachers from other schools and international organizations.

Leaders Program: Completing a three-year cycle with the 35 leaders in this program, who are now working on social business plans. Partnered again with USAID to take 100 community leaders, including elected officials, through a 6-month training to build skills in collaboration and communication.

Disciples Program: Enrolled 15 full-scholarship students in three Haitian seminaries with the launch of the Micah Scholars initiative in September. We've also distributed 5,000 Creole Bibles in recent months.
